The League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) seeks to advance the economic condition, educational attainment, political influence, housing, health and civil rights of Hispanic Americans through community-based programs.

- The LULAC Virtual Summit, where top leaders and experts from government, corporate, and Latino organizations discuss issues affecting the Latino community. The Summit features LULAC's Virtual Career Fair, which is open to job seekers August 14 and 15, 2020 from 1PM to 5PM EST.
- United Latino Job Bank connects job seekers and employers through job listings. Over 25,000 job alerts have been created here and more than 5,000 positions filled.
- Grow with Google has helped millions of Americans improve their small businesses and find jobs. It also helps educators with digital tools and supports veterans with career workshops.
- The Latino Flash Pitch Competition fosters connections, inspires learning and creates a community around Latino entrepreneurship and innovation. Startups from every sector and industry can apply for funding.
- Ayuda en Español provides COVID-19 resources in English and Spanish. This interactive resource offers the latest updates on health, social services, business, technology resources and more. Also available in English.
- Empower Hispanic America Through Technology (EHAT) Centers serve over 150K Latinos in communities across the United States and Puerto Rico, providing state of the art digital equipment to aid in schoolwork, job searching and interview prep, college and financial aid prep and financial literacy. There are 67 active centers in over 29 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico.

National Urban League

The mission of the <u>National Urban League (NUL)</u> is to help African-Americans and others in underserved communities achieve their highest true social parity, economic self-reliance, power, and civil rights. NUL's goal is for every American to have access to jobs

with a living wage and good benefits, by helping people find jobs, get training and pursue rewarding careers.

- <u>Urban Apprenticeships Job Program</u> offers preparatory training (social support services), pre-apprenticeship, and registered apprenticeships.
- <u>Urban Reentry Jobs Program</u> provides opportunities to obtain industry-recognized credentials, mentoring, and support services for formerly incarcerated individuals.
- <u>Urban Tech Jobs Program</u> focuses on unemployed, underemployed and incumbent adults interested in tech
 facing jobs (e.g. Helpdesk, Analyst, Programmer, Project Manager). Includes enrollment in tech training and
 certification, and covers examination fee.
- <u>Urban Youth Empowerment Program</u> offers opportunities for Justice Involved Youth, ages 18 to 24. Also provides job readiness, educational interventions, and community service learning for young adults, ages 16 to 24, who have been involved with the court system.
- <u>Urban Seniors Jobs Program</u> is designed to serve low-income adults 55+, with job readiness, financial literacy, and work based training (paid). Participants can apply for full-time openings where they are trained or carry skills to another employment opportunity.

Use LinkedIn to Your Advantage

- <u>LinkedIn</u> is the world's largest professional network with 706+ million users in more than 200 countries and territories worldwide.
- It is free to create a profile make one today and keep it up to date.
- Use a professional-looking profile picture. You don't need to pay for a professional photo you can use your phone camera in "portrait mode" to take one. Remember to have the light facing you and make sure your background is neat and tidy.
- Include a description that makes viewers of your profile interested to learn more about you.
- Join LinkedIn groups to follow important industry trends and make valuable connections.

Virtual Job Search and Interviewing Best Practices

- Prepare answers (in written and verbal form)
- Prepare a few key questions (in written and verbal form)
- Stay professional (no abbreviations)
- Bring your positive attitude
- Don't hide behind your screen (treat like face-to-face)
- Follow up after keep it short and sweet and do it within 24 hours

Sell Yourself

- Prepare your elevator pitch. This is the 30-second pitch that tells someone about you. There is a 4-part formula:
 - o Who are you?
 - What you do
 - Top skills
 - What you want to do
- Know your own skills and have stories / examples that describe each skill
- Research the company where you are interviewing
- Always have your updated and professional resume on hand
- Define your personal brand. Think of:
 - O What makes you, you?
 - O What makes you different?
 - O What are your strengths?
 - What are the things that you are not good at (that are okay to not be good at because they don't align with your personal brand)
- Tie your personal brand to the job skills and culture you are applying to
